



#### **Tips for Travel by Car:**

Traveling by car safely means putting your child in a car seat. This can be hard, especially on long trips. Here are three ways that can help make traveling by car a little easier on everyone.

- 1. Ride in the back seat with your infant on long trips
  - Riding with your infant can help you stick to a feeding schedule and offer immediate care. However, don't breastfeed while the car is in motion.
- 2. Pack a bag with items to keep your child occupied.
  - Young children's attention spans are short. Toys, books, paper and crayons, or similar items can help keep them entertained on longer trips.
- 3. Stop frequently to give everyone some breaks.
  - No one likes to sit in a car for a long time. Allowing for frequent breaks lets everyone stretch their legs and move their bodies.
