

#### **Health and SafetyTips**

Playgrounds allow young children to exercise their bodies, brains, and social skills through unstructured, free play. While playing, children also building strength and coordination, which is important for healthy development. Here are three ways you can help ensure your child is safe while climbing, sliding, swinging, and running.

- 1. **Actively supervise your child**: Active adult guidance and supervision is the best way to prevent injuries.
- 2. **Dress your child in appropriate clothing** Scarves, necklaces, and drawstrings can get caught on equipment and cause injury.
- 3. **Encourage children to play on age-appropriate equipment** Some structures are made for older children. Direct your child to play on equipment suited for their age group.
