Outdoor Play & Safety Tips

Winter doesn't have to stop your child from playing outside. Here are four things you can do to keep your child safe while playing in the cold. Watch our latest vlog episode to see these tips in action:

- 1. **Dress your child in multiple thin layers** A good rule of thumb is to dress children in one more layer than an adult would wear in the same temperature.
- 2. Cover your child from head to toe A hat, gloves or mittens, thick socks, and insulated or waterproof shoes can help ensure your child is better protected from the cold.
- 3. **Keep them hydrated**: Cold weather is drier and causes children to lose more water through their breath.
- 4. Injury prevention: Encourage children to avoid walking on ice.
