#### **Health and SafetyTip**

Children are going to be indoors during extreme cold temperatures. Here are three things to be mindful of in your home to keep your child safe through what remains of winter:

- **Keep candles out of reach:** Candles are great for making your home feel (and smell) inviting and may be needed for light in the event you lose power. However, the open flame is a risk to your child. Keep lit candles on high shelves where little hands can't easily touch them.
- Limit access to your fireplace: Most fireplaces are located in an area that is easily accessible to young children. Put a barrier between your child and the

- fireplace, such as a gate, and encourage them not to play around it.
- Use space heaters wisely: Space heaters are a great tool for colder rooms in your home. However, don't leave young children in a room alone with a space heater, and keep space heaters at least three feet away.

Homes are places where children feel safe and secure. You can help it remain that way by keeping these tips in mind.
