Make a Nomination



Winter is upon us and that isn't going to stop children from playing outside. Here are some helpful tips to keep children safe this winter:

1. Dress infants and children warmly for outdoor activities.

• A good rule of thumb from the <u>American Academy of Pediatrics</u> is to dress children in one more layer than an adult would wear in the same conditions. Include additional layers with your child for outdoor playtime while at child care.

2. Utilize winter accessories.

• Boots, gloves, and a hat go a long way in keeping children warm alongside thin

layers and a coat. Include these items with your child when you drop them off at child care.

- 3. Take off bulky coats when putting a child in their car seat.
  - Thick coats leave extra space under a harness, leaving children less secure in their car seat. Thin, snug layers ensure they're warm and safe.
