## <u>Child Care Licensing – Screen</u> Time Reminders

Physical activity is crucial for children 0-5 years old. As their provider, you can help them get the activity they need by limiting screen time. Remember, kids older than 2 years should be limited to age-appropriate content that does not exceed one hour of screen time and should be offered other choices. Educational computer programming for children under 5 should not exceed two hours.

Under her leadership, she guided the state through the implementation of the early childhood requirements in the LEARNS Act and:

- The transition of hundreds of staff from DHS to ADE.
- The statewide rollout of the CLASS observation tool in early childhood classrooms.
